# Whitefly populations are consuming South Georgia produce crops

Most South Georgians can attest to the omnipresence of pests below the Fall Line, but it takes a lot more than a can of "Off!" and a citronella candle for Georgia farmers to ward off the booming whitefly population that is taking a toll on their crops this fall.

Whiteflies are small, winged insects that feed on the foliage of plants and carry a number of crop-crippling diseases. Despite their diminutive size, these insects are causing big problems for produce growers.

Whiteflies have previously had a presence in South Georgia, but their population has increased significantly in the last year. Although whiteflies are typically a fall pest, Georgia produce growers began to see elevated populations relatively early this spring, according to Tim Coolong, Ph.D., a vegetable researcher

based on the Tifton Campus of the University of Georgia's College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences.

"If we see them in the spring, that means we are going to have a really bad year. Last fall we had a very high population, and that was combined with a very mild winter, so this year we started seeing elevated populations of the whitefly even relatively early in the spring," said Coolong. "I would say this fall or late summer they became a very serious pest of both vegetables and row crops such as cotton."

These high populations coupled with a very temperate winter created conditions that have allowed these sap-sucking insects to continue exponential growth, further damaging the crops and the wallets of many South Georgia farmers.

# Georgia logs zero complaints of dicamba drift during 2017 growing season Manufacturers are finalizing label changes for 2018

No official pesticide drift complaints have been reported to the Georgia Department of Agriculture this year due to in-season applications of dicamba to cotton and soybeans.

"The GDA believes the absence of any formal dicamba, in-crop drift complaints can be directly attributed to UGA Extension's unique education and training approach," said Tommy Gray, director of the GDA's Plant Industry Division. "During these classroom and one-on-one trainings, growers are provided all the information they need to properly and safely use these products. Perhaps the most important piece of information Georgia growers learn in these meetings is that they must use extreme caution when applying these products to cotton or soybeans in fields where susceptible crops are nearby. You must be aware of your surroundings."

From 2015 to 2017, UGA Extension agents and specialists coordinated classroom trainings in an effort to share their research-based results and, ultimately, to help Georgia cotton and soybean producers make wise decisions in safely and effectively implementing this technology. To date, 33 of these meetings have reached almost 3,000 participants.

"Understanding the sensitivity of the plants that surround the field when an applicator is ready to make an application is the No. 1 factor that helps us continue to reduce off-target movement of all pesticides," said UGA Extension weed specialist Stanley Culpepper. "These educational trainings help make applicators and farmers more aware and are a big reason why we haven't had any complaints to the (Georgia) Department of Agriculture this year."

Approximately 1.3 million acres of Georgia land planted with tolerant cotton or soybeans were treated with auxin herbicides, such as dicamba, during the growing season.

"Although we had a great year in regard to weed control and stewarding the new auxin technologies, we have much more to do if we want to preserve these weed management tools," Culpepper said.

UGA Extension personnel will expand educational trainings through one-on-one meetings with producers and applicators statewide to further im-See **DICAMBA**, page **7**

# HAULING MANURE IN GEORGIA: What you need to know

Approximately 1.5 million tons of poultry litter is produced by Georgia's poultry industry each year. A large portion of the litter produced in North Georgia is hauled to South Georgia to fertilize row crops.

The poultry industry has existed in North Georgia for many years, and manure applied to the surrounding land area has saturated those fields with nutrients such as phosphorus. When there is heavy rainfall, phosphorus in the field can run off into nearby surface water. This leads to nutrient enrichment of those water bodies and can cause negative effects such as algal blooms in lakes and ponds. Therefore, it's a good thing when North Georgia poultry producers haul litter from their own nutrient-rich region to nutrient-deficient areas in the southern region of the state. However, manure haulers must follow the Animal Manure Handlers Rules when hauling, piling and applying manure at remote delivery points.

The Animal Manure Handlers Rules in Chapter 40-13-8 of the Georgia Code fall under the jurisdiction of the Georgia Department of Agriculture. These rules not only apply to those transporting manure hundreds of miles, but also to those hauling it a short distance down the road. Exemptions to this rule are:

- 1. Persons who handle less than 5 tons of dry manure or 5,000 gallons of liquid manure per year.
- 2. Persons who solely handle manure that originates from their farm and utilize it on the property under their ownership or control.
- 3. Persons who solely transport and utilize manure on their own farm that originates on another farm. However, such activities must be in accordance with the Animal Manure Handlers Rules.

If you haul manure and do not qualify for the above exemptions, your first step should be to apply for a manure handler's permit

from the GDA. If your permit is approved, you will have to meet the following requirements:

Transportation and Equipment

- 1, Biosecurity precaution should be exercised in the collection, storage, and transportation and depositing or spreading of animal manure.
- 2. Transport vehicles must be designed and maintained to prevent leaks or spillage. Vehicles must also be covered to prevent blowing or spillage of loose material or liquids. If a spill does occur, cleanup is the responsibility of the manure handler.
- 3. All land application equipment must be calibrated on an annual basis.

### Storage of Animal Manure by Animal Manure Handlers

- 1. If manure must be stored before land application, all manure must be immediately covered and stored in a manner that to prevents runoff, discharges and breeding of insects. Storage location should be where all rain water is diverted away from the site.
- 2. If manure is a liquid, then it must be stored in a sealed, leak-proof container.
- 3. All storage sites must be located a minimum of 200 feet from the neighboring property line.

#### Land Application

When land-applying manure, there are several aspects that need to be considered. The University of Georgia Extension Service highly recommends getting a nutrient management plan in order to determine proper application rates.

The most important thing to remember during application is to keep the nutrients on the land and out of surface and groundwater. Also, if applying composted mortality, it is important to make sure the carcasses are completely decomposed before land application to comply with the manure haulers rules and the GDA Dead Animal Act Rules. This is important to keep wildlife and pets from dragging the carcasses onto neighboring property and to prevent the spread of diseas

Due to the above information, the following mandates are in the manure handler rules:

- 1. Animal manure cannot come into contact with groundwater or excessive runoff from rainfall (do not apply manure before a rain event).
- 2. Manure analysis needs to be provided to the manure handler from the livestock/ poultry producer. Manure samples should be collected and analyzed according to the producer's nutrient management plan or UGA Cooperative Extension Service guidelines.
- 3. Mortality should be removed from animal manure.
- 4. If land application is near a surface water body - streams, ponds, springs, sinkholes, wetlands — you must maintain a 100-foot non-vegetated or 35-foot perennial vegetated buffer away from the water body. Also, a 100-foot buffer must be maintained between wells and application areas.
- Manure must be applied in a manner where it does not leave the property intended for application.

### **Record Keeping**

Record keeping is necessary to be in compliance with the rules, but also for self-protection if questions arise about your manure handling practices. The following rules must be kept and made available to the GDA upon request:

- 1. Name and address of each person where animal manure originates and is delivered. Animal manure analysis as provided by
- the livestock/poultry producer. 3. Date and total amount of animal manure
- delivered or land-applied. 4. The rate of land application of manure.


5. Date and method of equipment calibration. **Penalties** 

The manure handler rules are very straightforward and easy to understand. The rules, when followed, reduce the risk of environmental pollution and public nuisance. Failure to comply with the manure handlers rules can lead to the revocation of the permit and monetary penalties for each violation.



"New Deal" program helps rural communities ring in the latest technology

On Oct. 21, 1959, the Georgia Market Bulletin made note of the 10th anniversary of the Rural Electrification Administration's telephone loan program. The REA, which was housed in the U.S. Department of Agriculture, was created as part of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal program in 1935. To this day, the USDA provides low-interest loans for electrification and telecommunications improvement in rural communities through its Rural Development division.

From its inception in 1949 through July 1959, the telephone loan program issued \$585.2 million to 673 telephone systems in 45 states, including Alaska. The loans were used to construct 321,000 miles of line and other facilities to bring new or improved phone services to 1.2 million farmers and other rural subscribers. The program made telephone service available to 542,000 customers for the first time.

Today, the telephone is the preferred mode of communication between buyers and sellers who utilize the Market Bulletin. But on Oct. 21, 1959, only 150 of some 500 classified ads for goods and services published in the paper included telephone numbers. Were they so inclined and able, subscribers at the time could speak directly to the Market Bulletin staff in their office on Capitol Square in Atlanta by dialing JAckson 4-3292.

And while some of our subscribers now favor email over the phone as a means of communication, a great many of our subscribers still live in rural areas without reliable Internet access, which makes a computer as useful to them in 2017 as a telephone would have been in 1949.

The foundation will award five scholarships of \$3,000 each and seven scholarships of \$1,500 each.

Technical College Scholarship for Agriculture – This scholarship is for high school students who plan to enroll in a Georgia accredited technical college who will be majoring in an area of agriculture or agriculturally related field of study. The foundation will award five scholarships of \$1,000 each.

Rising College Junior/Senior Scholarship for Agriculture – This scholarship is for college students who have at least two semesters of college work remaining to receive an undergraduate degree from a unit of the University System of Georgia, Berry College, Emmanuel College or any accredited college/university in Georgia with an ag program. Applicants must be majoring in agriculture and environmental sciences, family and consumer sciences, or a related agriculture field. The foundation will award 10 scholarships of \$2,000 each.

UGA College of Veterinary Medicine Scholarship -This scholarship is for students currently enrolled in the

# **DICAMBA: Farmers are receptive to training**

prove information delivery. Training sessions will continue until 2020.

UGA Extension county agents who have already started meeting with farmers and applicators believe the trainings have been, and will continue to be, worthwhile.

"What (the trainings) have pointed out for me is the level of understanding of the new technology. Even among those who are solid farmers, the level of understanding is low as far as how the chemistry is formulated and how it truly works," Burke County Extension Coordinator Peyton Sapp said. "The whole approach that Georgia and UGA Extension has taken, embracing the new technology, has heightened the awareness of what's going on around a particular field.'

Individual trainings involve county extension agents visiting farms to teach growers and applicators about safe use of pesticides. Research identified 15 factors that applicators need to consider when managing off-target pesticide movement, including the spray nozzle, spray pressure, spray speed and the height of the boom above the target.

"We just want folks to realize that when they get to a field, they need to see what's going on before they make a decision about whether they need to spray or not," Irwin County Extension Coordinator Phillip Edwards said. "Make sure there aren't any sensitive crops nearby. Make sure of the wind speed and the lay of the land. A lot of it is common sense, but these trainings serve as a reminder."

Georgia farmers produce more than 50 high-value vegetable and fruit crops at the same time and sometimes around the same location that agronomic crops like auxin-tolerant cotton and soybeans are produced. All of these crops are vulnerable to pesticide drift.

Empowering growers and producers to keep pesticides on target and away from neighboring fields and gardens is one of UGA Extension's top priorities.

Pierce County Extension Coordinator James Jacobs has met with the majority of the farmers in his county. He said that all of those farmers who have been trained have been very receptive to the lessons taught and appreciate the time and resources that specialists and agents have shared.

"Taking it to the farm — that's what we're doing. It gives farmers, and even those who work for them, an opportunity to ask questions. If we don't know the answer, we get the answer and get it back to them. That's the good thing because this is the time to ask questions and put some thought in some things," Jacobs said.

Hundreds of complaints about off-target drift of herbicides containing dicamba have been reported in several Southern states since it was approved for in-season use. As a result of those complaints, manufacturers are working with the EPA to make several important changes to the labels on dicamba products. As soon as those changes are final, the GDA will make them and the new labels available on the department's auxin webpage at http://www.agr.georgia.gov/24c.aspx.

The changes will be covered in detail in a future issue of the Market Bulletin, as well.

# WHITEFLIES: Losses worth millions

years, or the cost to growers in terms of loss, in the eighty to one hundred million dollar range," said Coolong.

Typically whiteflies are manageable pests when present at low levels, but these tiny vectors carry a number of diseases which can be detrimental to crop growth and yields. This year some of the viruses that have spread as a result of whitefly infestation have included tomato yellow leaf curl virus, cucurbit leaf crumple virus, and cucurbit yellow stunting virus.

Sam Watson has seen devastating impacts on his squash, cucumber and bell pepper crops this year. Watson's operation, Chill C Farms in Moultrie, and numerous neighboring farms have felt the repercussions on their fall crops over the last two years

"I can do everything right on my farm and spend all the money I want to, but at the end of the day the population (of flies) is just too large to combat,' Watson said. "They're everywhere."

Although there are currently some resistant seed varieties on the market, private sector seed companies and UGA researchers are working handin-hand to conduct trials at research facilities and get resistant materials to reach the growers relatively soon, according to Coolong.

Outside of planting resistant varieties and spraying, there is not much that farmers have been able to do to control the whitefly population. Some farms have experienced up to 100 percent loss, according to Coolong and Watson. "We do what we feel like we can afford to do and that's about the best

you can do," said Watson. "You just have to hope and pray for the best."

# FARMERS UNDER 40: Aries Haygood

Farm: M & T Farms Inc. Hometown: Lyons Age: 34

**Q:** How did you get your start farming?

A: When my wife and I got married, I made the decision to come into the farm and work for her interest in the farm alongside of my father-in-law.

**Q:** What kinds of farming do you primarily spend your time doing?

**A:** I spend my time like any other typical farmer, from managing the land prep, managing all planting schedules, then producing the best crop and also managing the whole business's day to day operations.

**Q:** What are the challenges associated with this?

A: Sometimes it is a challenge for farmers to explain clearly to their employees what your goals are so they clearly understand how you would like for certain things to be handled (to) represent the farm's mission. I think it is very important to hire and train good employees to help with the work load that is on the backs of today's farmers.

**Q:** How do you think being a younger farmer affects you and your business?

A: One of the challenges is trying to find our place in the company or the farm. The older generation worked so hard to build a great foundation. Technology is changing the dynamics of the day-to-day practices, and we find ourselves trying to change certain older practices to a more efficient approach and sometimes that is not received well. One advantage we have as young farmers is that with the technology changing so fast, we are more willing to explore the technology and decide if it is a good fit on our farms.


**Q:** Do you think this is a positive aspect or does it pose any challenges for you?

A: It can be challenging working with family and trying to implement changes. It is important for us younger farmers to keep a close eye on the changes to ensure ourselves and

our parents – or in my case my father-inlaw – understand how the changes can help the farm. Anytime we can back up our ideas with facts it is hard to argue against us.

**Q:** What kind of advice would you give to other young farmers?

A: I would advise other farmers to always try and stay positive and seek the Lord as you farm. Go to him daily and ask for his guidance. Some days it is going to be hard, and some days you will lose your cool, but have that foundation established and know where to go when you feel like there is no way out. Also, plan for some bad years so you don't outgrow yourself. God will bless us, and he will do it on his time-frame he has for us. Just try and be obedient, and go to him for that direction.



A: Same advice I gave above. I have to remind myself to set aside time to go to the Bible and seek what I am supposed to do. Sometimes we get so busy with the planting and harvest seasons that we forget to do this, and that is when you are making your most important decisions, and we need him to help us make those decisions.

**Q:** You have had a tough year health-wise. How has your experience changed your view on farming?

A: First thing it did was open my eyes to what is truly important in life. I know now that my relationships with God and my family are more important than worrying about some of the little things on the farm. I also began to look deep into how I can use my farm to minister to the people in my community and help them get through hard times. I knew from the first day of my diagnosis with colon cancer that God was with me and directing me. This encourages me to try and seek how I

can honor him and show my appreciation for him being there with me through this journey.

**Q:** What would you be doing if you weren't a farmer?

A: I graduated with a marketing degree from Georgia Southern University. I always thought I would move to Atlanta and find a job that would have been related to that type of background. I really love to be around people and talking with them. I had a teacher in high school who told me one day I would be a good salesman, so maybe I would have pushed to do it.
