USDA awards \$1.5 million in Georgia to support local ag initiatives

The U.S. Department of Agriculture and the University of Georgia recently announced six grant awards of \$145,000 each to local organizations in Georgia to advance agricultural initiatives and support community garden production.

The recipients of the one-time award funding are Turn Around Columbus; Rockdale County Administration, Conyers; Southern Sky Center for Diverse Arts and Culture Inc., Sylvester; Lowndes Associated Ministries to People Inc., Valdosta; Change Church, Duluth; and Peachtree Farm, Peachtree Corners.

USDA Farm Service Agency's nationwide investment of \$43.1 million is through the American Rescue Plan Act for Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production. According to the announcement of the grant awards, the grant program aims to support US-DA's efforts to strengthen the food supply chain and transform the food system to be fairer, more competitive, and more resilient. These grant investments in Georgia will help assist food-insecure communities and serve producers in areas where the FSA has historically not had a presence, according to Arthur Tripp, USDA Farm Service Agency state executive director in Georgia.

"This historic investment will create and enhance community gardens and improve food system needs across the state of Georgia," Tripp said. "We are extremely excited to announce the six recipients of funding, who will enhance their community gardens and programs to increase access to healthy foods and educate their communities on the importance of agriculture throughout the state of Georgia."

Ronzell Buckner, executive director of Turn Around Columbus, welcomed the grant funding, which will support his organization's efforts in providing fresh produce to the community and educating youth through its George Washington Carver Victory Garden and Farm.

UGA, Grand Farm announce ag-tech innovation partnership in Perry

The University of Georgia College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (CAES) and Grand Farm, a leading innovator in agricultural technology, announced a collaboration to create a regional agricultural innovation ecosystem in central Georgia.

Located on 250 acres in Perry, next to the Georgia National Fairgrounds and Agricenter and at the heart of the state's agricultural landscape, CAES and Grand Farm are coming together to build the University of Georgia Grand Farm, a working innovation farm with plans to deploy the first field projects in 2025. The farm will be a hub for research, education and sustainable agriculture practices. It will harness the power of precision agriculture, robotics and data analytics to increase productivity, conserve resources and ensure food security for future generations.

"This collaboration represents the perfect marriage of tradition and innovation," said CAES Dean and Director Nick T. Place. "By bringing together the college's world-class researchers and the UGA Institute for Integrative Precision Agriculture with Grand Farm's cutting-edge technologies, we will revolutionize the way we feed and clothe the world's population."

Grand Farm will begin working closely with UGA to establish a local team and engage with key ecosystem stakeholders.

"This partnership is a great example of how Grand Farm works to advance agriculture technology and solve grower pain points across varied geographies," said William Aderholdt, executive director of Grand Farm. "Collaborating with the University of Georgia allows us to leverage their extensive research capabilities and expertise in agricultural sciences, enhancing

Georgia partners with FieldWatch to promote safe pesticide usage

The Georgia Department of Agriculture (GDA) recently announced a collaboration with FieldWatch to enable Georgia's beekeepers and crop producers to access the latest technology and ensure safer pesticide application practices.

FieldWatch is a non-profit organization working to enhance communication and stewardship among beekeepers, crop producers, and pesticide applicators. The GDA announced the partnership on June 26, providing users with a secure online registry to map apiaries and crop fields.

According to the GDA announcement, the partnership with FieldWatch is the latest step in the Department's efforts to promote and encourage safe, efficient pesticide use.

"The state of Georgia is excited to partner with FieldWatch to make their innovative technology available to Georgia farmers and beekeepers alike," Georgia Agriculture Commissioner Tyler Harper said in the announcement. "This partnership gives our farmers another tool in the toolbox as we work together to ensure the continued success of Georgia agriculture and make our #1 industry more sustainable by promoting safe, effective, and efficient pesticide usage."

The Department's partnership with Field-Watch follows the state's years-long effort to reduce pesticide drift and encourage safe pesticide usage through the Using Pesticides Wisely Program (UPW). UPW, a collaboration between the Department and UGA Extension, is the nation's largest pesticide safety and education program and has successfully trained over 17,000 Georgians on safe pesticide usage.

The GDA's membership decision was driven by the needs of crop producers and beekeepers who wanted to register the locations of their apiaries and crops. The announcement said that FieldWatch's tools, such as DriftWatch and Bee-Check, will enable Georgia's agricultural com-

munity to register their locations easily and securely, promote sustainable pesticide usage practices, and be free and available to all Georgia beekeepers and crop producers.



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MERCER MEDICAL: July is UV safety awareness month

As the weather warms up and people spend more time outdoors, it is important to be aware of the risks associated with exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from sunlight. July is not only one of Georgia's hottest and sunniest months of the year but also National UV Safety Awareness Month. This recognition serves as a reminder to be mindful of sun exposure and to protect our skin from the harmful effects

of UV radiation. Here is some information to help you enjoy summer without letting the harmful rays damage your skin. What is UV radiation?

UV radiation is an invisible form of energy released by the sun. There are two types of UV radiation that reach the earth's surface: UVA and UVB. UVA rays are responsible for premature aging and long-term skin damage, whereas UVB rays are more intense and result in sunburn. UV radiation cannot be seen or felt. Exposure to both UVA and UVB rays contributes to an increased risk of skin cancer.

Dangers associated with UV exposure

There are more harmful effects of UV exposure than a simple sunburn and premature aging. Extended and unprotected exposure can significantly increase the risk of developing skin cancer. Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer worldwide, and many types of skin cancer are linked to UV radiation. Basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma are the most common but are very treatable if caught on time. Although less common, both Merkel cell carcinoma and mel-

anoma are more likely to be fatal. Importantly, UV radiation can also cause eye damage, increasing the risk of cataracts and other eye diseases, which may eventually lead to vision loss.

Common sun safety misconceptions

Sun protection is only necessary on sunny days: Even in overcast weather, UVA and UVB rays are still emitted and can cause damage.

Sunscreen is the only form of sun protection that is necessary: While it helps, sunscreen does not block out all sun rays. Protective clothing and shade are also necessary.

Your risk for skin cancer is only increased by sunburns: Any UV exposure can increase the risk of skin cancer. A sunburn is not necessary for an increased risk.

Protection

Protection from UV rays is vital in preventing harmful consequences. There are several protective measures that can be taken:

- Sunscreen. Choose a sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30. Apply a generous amount to sun-exposed areas 20 minutes before going outside. Reapply the sunscreen every 2 hours and more frequently if swimming or sweating.
- Protective clothing. Covering up with long sleeves, long pants, and a hat can protect the skin from exposure. There are also specially made UV-protective clothing options available.
- Sunglasses. Protecting your eyes from UV radiation is essential. When selecting the right pair of sunglasses, ensure they are UVA and UVB protective.
- Shade from the sun. When possible, seek shade, especially between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., when the sun's rays are strongest. Trees, umbrellas, and canopies provide good protection from the sun.

UV Safety Awareness Month is an important reminder to protect our skin from UV radiation during the summer. With warmer weather, people spend more time outdoors, increasing the likelihood of UV damage. By understanding the risks associated with UV radiation exposure and incorporating protective measures, we can spend time in the sun safely. Visit skincancer.org to learn more about UV safety.

GOOD TO GROW: Starting a garden from scratch by finding success with plant selection

In Georgia, it's possible to grow vegetables throughout the year. Choose plants well-suited to your local climate and growing conditions. A garden is an investment of time and money, so plant things you like to eat and try one or two new things each season.

Consider incorporating pollinator plants in or around the garden for a burst of extra beauty that will attract pollinators and

other beneficial insects. The UGA Extension Home Gardening Series provides valuable advice on specific fruits and vegetables, like selecting appropriate plant varieties and considering factors like frost dates, heat tolerance and disease resistance, to help you make informed choices.

When choosing plants, Ney recommends following the planting instructions on the seed packets to consider the size of full-grown plants. An efficient garden layout maximizes the space and promotes healthy plant growth. Remember to check the number of days from planting to maturity to keep a regular succession of plantings throughout the season and year.

Choosing whether to transplant seedlings or directly seed into your soil depends on a few factors. Transplanting seedlings may be easier than starting from seeds, and some plants,

like tomatoes and peppers, significantly benefit from starting as transplants, giving your garden a six- to eight-week head start on production. However, root vegetables like radishes, carrots, turnips and beets should be directly seeded. Plants like beans, corn and lettuce can also be directly seeded. Whether starting from seed or transplants, use loose, disease-free soil mix and avoid overwatering.

Insect management

Finally, vigilant pest, weed and disease management is crucial for protecting your garden investment. Integrated pest management principles emphasize prevention, monitoring and targeted intervention to minimize chemical use and promote ecological balance.

der mites, Mexican bean beetles, leafhoppers, corn earworms and the Colorado potato beetle.

In the home garden, regular inspection may reduce the need for chemical controls of these pests. Check the entire plant, including the underside of the leaves, for evidence of pests, and remove adults and eggs by hand to reduce their populations throughout the season. Take some time to review the various stages of each of these common garden pests so you don't accidentally kill beneficial insects and pollinators.

Weed control

Using herbicides in the home garden is difficult and not generally recommended. While several pre- and post-emergent herbicides are available through home gardening stores, no single herbicide can be used for all crops, and the amount of herbicide is critical. Too much may injure or kill garden plants, while too little will not effectively kill weeds.

Hand-pulling weeds in the home garden is the most efficient and practical method of weed management, but landscape fabrics and mulch materials can act as barriers against weeds, Ney said. Using cardboard or mulches made from plastic or wood between garden rows can also help minimize weeds

Disease reduction

Start with clean, disease-free seeds and transplants. Avoid watering late in the day because wet foliage contributes to disease problems.

If a plant shows signs of disease, remove infected leaves and avoid overhead irrigation; droplets can bounce from the infected plant to healthy plants nearby.

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FOCUS ON FOOD: How material management can save your business money

You might feel your business doesn't need a sustainability program or that it'll be too complicated to start. In reality, they don't need to be overwhelming, and small changes can save you a lot of money over time.

Sustainable Material Management (SMM) is a way of using and reusing materials more productively over time. These economic practices are critical in elevating process efficiency, economic growth, and resource independence, increasing domestic supply chain security, and help in protecting the environment. It looks at each stage of a product's lifecycle by identifying manufacturing inputs, such as raw materials (ingredients and packaging), and energy and outputs generated, such as waste, emissions, and by-products. A SMM plan helps us to identify opportunities to conserve resources, reduce costs, increase process and facility efficiency, and reduce environmental impacts.

These sustainability programs can also boost your brand image, showing people that you are a responsible steward of our natural resources. By taking a step-by-step approach, you can create and develop your own SMM to support your company's growth. Here are a few tips on how to approach the SMM and create your programs:

Regulations. Determine the federal and state regulations your company must follow to protect your product, employees, consumers, and the environment. Federal and state regulations require specific disposal methods and limits. Depending on the type and volume of waste and trash, it's critical to determine if it's non-hazardous or hazardous and what mandatory regulations you must follow when handling, storing, packing, and throwing it away.

Resource and Process Efficiency. Determine and evaluate all inputs you will use, and monitor your utility bills to see if there are any opportunities to save. Perform utility audits for

water or air leaks, places that use excess electricity, and other portunities: less raw material, less waste, and fewer emisareas to improve efficiency.

For instance, when working on energy efficiency, start with big items like generators and go down the list of equipment.

Does your air conditioning have to run 24/7 if you have only one shift? Does your fridge and freezers have optimized temperature settings?

Optimize your inventory. Purchase locally to support resource independence and increase domestic supply chain security. If your facility has hazardous materials, evaluate the overall inventory. What quantity is necessary to have on site, and how often do you dispose of it?

Output Efficiency and Optimization. The SMM concept recognizes outputs not as waste but as valuable and profitable resources where possible. Following the circular economy model, this approach may increase sustainable opsions.

Upcycling, recycling, and reusing when possible will reduce the use of resource inputs as well as outputs by reducing waste. Upcycling is reusing waste or unwanted materials without destroying them to create something new. It has become more popular recently since recycling requires additional inputs to break down old and unneeded materials into something new that can be used to manufacture new products.

> For example, the candle industry can reuse wax disks used by textile companies. Spent grain from Georgia beer breweries can be used as livestock feed. Normally thrown in a landfill, these outputs can be donated or even sold to other companies. "One man's trash is another man's treasure."

> Monitoring and data analysis. Taking a good look at all the data lets us understand more about all the inputs, outputs, and opportunities for improvement. It's important to identify and implement sustainability goals based on your data and keep checking the data to see if any changes need to be made.

GEORGIA COOKING: Southern baked yellow squash casserole

Yellow squash casserole is a classic Southern dish that appears at church potlucks, dinner tables, and family gatherings in the summertime. The combination of creamy squash filling and crunchy buttery topping makes this dish a winner

There are as many ways to make yellow squash casserole as there are mothers and aunts out there. Recipes vary from slicing squash into coins or lengthwise to mashing them into chunks. Then, there is the topping. I have overheard conversations between ladies in the church buffet line critiquing the use of Ritz brand crackers over Toll House and vice versa. I've also enjoyed a casserole

with croutons mixed with butter and Parmesan cheese.

This recipe comes from Howard Brown Farms in Montezuma. Regardless of the recipe, the true essence of yellow squash casserole is best savored in the company of cherished friends and family.

Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 75 minutes Serves 10

Ingredients

3 lbs. yellow summer squash, cut into 1-inch cubes 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs 1/2 cup chopped onion 2 eggs

- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 1 Tbsp white sugar

1 tsp salt 1/2 tsp black pepper 1/4 cup butter, melted 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs

Instructions

- 1. Preheat an oven to 375 F. Grease a 2-quart baking dish.
- 2. Place the squash in a large saucepan, cover with water, and boil until soft, about 15 minutes. Drain the squash well, place in a large mixing bowl, and mash until slightly chunky.
- 3. Stir in 1/2 cup of bread crumbs, onion, eggs, 1/4 cup of butter, sugar, salt, and pepper until thoroughly combined, and spread



mixture into the prepared baking dish.

- 4. Drizzle the top of the casserole with 1/4 cup melted butter, and sprinkle 1/4 cup bread crumbs over the butter.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until the casserole is cooked through and the top is golden brown, about 1 hour.





merely a distant concept or an industry that ensures their nourishment. However, that is not the case with me; I was fortunate enough to have firsthand experience with this industry while growing up.

For some, agriculture is

My least favorite thing to hear after school was, "Go get your boots on." This meant nothing other than what I

considered a long day of work ahead, maybe 2 or 3 hours. I would put my boots on, pout a little, and then head to the farm with my two brothers, where we worked on our third-generation poultry farm. This farm consists of 12 houses accompanied by a list of chores. When I was young, it didn't seem fair that I would have to work on the farm when my friends got to do whatever they pleased after school and throughout the summer. What I didn't realize then was how impactful these days would be on my life. My brothers and I were not overworked by any means, but we occasionally acted like it. Our work included simple tasks, such as washing lids, picking

up lids, preparing the houses for a new batch of chickens and the list goes on.

Throughout our time spent within the walls of those

chicken houses, barns and sheds, community was built, friends were made, and work ethic was instilled. I was also fortunate enough to have the support of a tight-knit community that consistently lends a helping hand when needed. I'm studying Agricultural Economics at the University of Georgia while interning in the Ag Inputs Division at the Georgia Department of Agriculture. It's safe to assume I wouldn't be pursuing these opportunities if it had not been for the invaluable lessons I learned growing up.

Dog and cat sterilization program grant awards announced to 93 organizations

A committee of animal industry professionals reviewed all

ATLANTA – Georgia Agriculture Commissioner Tyler Harper announced the Georgia Department of Agriculture (GDA) awarded grant awards to 93 organizations for the 2024 Dog and Cat Sterilization Program (DCSP).

The Georgia Department of Agriculture's DCSP grant helps reduce the strain of overpopulation on Georgia's animal shelters by providing financial assistance for low-cost spay/ neuter programs in communities across the state. The DCSP received \$800,000 in funding for Fiscal Year 2024.

The Department received nearly 170 applications and issued 93 awards between \$1,000 and \$20,000 based on each applicant's needs, according to the announcement of the grant awards.

"I'm excited to congratulate the more than 90 organizations who were selected to receive this year's DCSP grant awards and thank them for the work they do every single day to ensure Georgia's shelter pets receive the humane care they deserve," said Harper in his June 21 announcement of the grant awards. "The Dog and Cat Sterilization Program is vital as we work to address animal overpopulation in our state, and we look forward to ensuring the program's continued success for years to come." applications to ensure fairness. Applications were reviewed



anonymously. Animal control and shelters operated by county and municipal governments make up about one-third of the total grant awards. The other grant recipients are non-profit organizations.

To be eligible for a DCSP grant, applicants must fall into one of the following categories: County and/or municipal animal shelters licensed and located in Georgia, licensed non-profit animal rescue organizations with 501(c)(3) status located in Georgia, or veterinary medical foundations in Georgia with 501(c)(3) status.

In 2003, the Georgia General Assembly established the Dog and Cat Reproductive Sterilization Support Program to subsidize spaying and neutering procedures for dogs and cats. This initiative led to the Dog and Cat Sterilization Program (DCSP), overseen by the Georgia Department of Agriculture. Funding for the program is currently generated by selling designated dog and cat license plates. These specialized plates are obtainable at local tag offices or through contributions made via the Georgia Tax return process.

Turn Around Columbus is located in a neighborhood where residents have come together to rid the area of drug abuse and help local schools with student delinquency. The farm and garden provide jobs to students while also furnishing ag education in a unique way.

"We hope that in teaching them about agriculture, we can get more of our kids to look at agriculture as a career to pursue once they graduate from school," Buckner said.

Buckner said he is looking forward to using the grant funding to purchase a tractor and other equipment to operate the farm. He said cool-down tents are needed to help students working there deal with the summer heat.

Rockdale County is about 25 miles east of Atlanta and will use its grant award to establish a mediation garden for residents and a demonstration garden for children. Rockdale County Commissioner Sherri Washington led the effort to obtain the grant. She said the project will help provide services and introduce residents to the benefits of urban agriculture. "I am elated that Rockdale County is now a recipient of a USDA/UGA grant that will allow us to not only help alleviate food insecurities but also teach our community how to become self-sufficient," Washington said in an email. "One of the most exciting elements of this community garden is that it will incorporate a meditation garden that will allow us to grow herbs and create spaces for yoga, meditation, and sound meditation."

The UGA Archway Partnership was the original recipient of the \$1.5 million total grant in 2023 and will administer the grant. According to a press release announcing the grant awards, UGA Archway held listening sessions to gather needs assessments of agriculture and community gardens across the state. Archway and other UGA faculty, along with USDA personnel, then met with farmers and agricultural producers to understand the communities' underlying needs in selecting the six entities in Georgia.

Georgie's Drive Thru Darien

Hello! I'm Georgie, the Georgia Grown mascot. I travel the state of Georgia promoting our #1 industry, agriculture! Too many times as of late have I come to write articles about landmarks that no longer exist. Thursday morning, I learned that the Huston House on Butler Island near Darien had burned to the ground.

The island itself has a deep and tragic history involving slavery, including the largest single sale of human beings, 436, at one time in history in 1859. After Sherman's March to the Sea in 1864, Butler Island laid dormant until Colonel T.L. Huston purchased it after World War I. Huston was very wealthy and co-owned the New York Yankees when they acquired Babe Ruth from the Red Sox. After selling his stake in the Yankees in 1923, Huston moved to Georgia, bought an island near Darien, and later purchased nearby Butler Island.

The historic Huston House was built in 1927 while Colonel Huston cultivated the island, growing produce and operating a Guernsey Dairy there. Colonel Huston died on the island in 1938 and is buried at Christ Church Cemetery on Saint Simons Island.

Quality beef in show and in the classroom

PERRY – The Georgia FFA Jr. Beef Futurity Show at the Georgia National Fairgrounds on June 26-29 offered the best of both worlds in raising beef in Georgia. The event showcased FFA and 4-H middle and high school students showing their livestock, while the Georgia Beef Board offered Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) training at the event for the first time.

About 100 people attended the BQA training, which covers best-practice husbandry techniques coupled with accepted scientific knowledge to raise cattle under optimum management conditions. Topics included handling and transporting animals, biosecurity, record keeping, and vaccination administration.

BQA training is offered free to all cattle producers by the Georgia Beef Board in partnership with the University

of Georgia Extension Service. The training is funded by the state's beef commodity check-off assessment - where producers agree to a self-assessment fee to pay for research, education and marketing to benefit Georgia-raised beef.

Caitlin Jackson of the Georgia Beef Board said it was the first time they held BQA training at the futurity show in Perry. Producers can obtain BQA certification through online courses at www.bqa.org and in-person training hosted by the Georgia Beef Board each year.

Jackson said Perry was the ideal place to hold the training this year due to its central location. Doing so during a FFA and 4-H livestock show offered an opportunity to reach young people and their families.

"This is the Beef Board's effort to reach younger audiences with the hope that we have participants from the futurity along with parents, ag teachers, county agents, and all producers," Jackson said. "It's open to everyone, but we are hopeful for participation from all the kids there showing their animals because those are our future beef cattle producers."

Jackson said most producers already do the things taught in BQA training. She explained what BQA does is help producers raise the best quality product for consumers. "We're trying to change producer's mindset into thinking we are raising a beef product. This is not just the animal that's on the hoof in front of us," she said.

"If we start thinking along the lines of we are raising someone's Fourth of July hamburgers or someone's Christmas roast and being mindful of the things that we're doing to the animal, starting from birth, all the way until finishing and harvesting, really leads to the best beef product that we possibly can put out there."
